The visiting European delegation of Christian leaders has formally apologized to Africa for crimes committed during the slave trade era and colonization of the continent.

The confessions were made before hundreds of delegates who included former Mozambican President, Mr. Joachim Chissano, Science and Technology Development Minister, Dr. Olivia Muchena and President of the Council of Chiefs, Chief Fortune Charumbira. Also present at the occasion were 24 representatives of African countries.

Christian leaders from European countries, which include Britain, Germany, France, Portugal, Spain, the Netherlands and the United States, made the confessions. It was a touching moment when the Christian leaders knelt before Mr Chissano and his delegation, asking for forgiveness for the sins committed against Africa with some of them weeping.

They asked for forgiveness over the slave trade, exploitation of Africa using divide and rule tactics, fueling of conflicts and the shedding of innocent blood. The Christian leaders acknowledged that most of the problems in Africa today emanated from colonialism.

Confessions were made over the torture and denigrating of Africans as well as the introduction of the apartheid regime in South Africa. Chairperson of the European African Reconciliation Process, Mr Chris Seaton, who confessed on behalf of Britain, asked for pardon for the sins committed by Britain against Zimbabwe during the colonial era.

Mr Seaton was wrapped in the Union Jack, which was hoisted when Zimbabwe was colonized. He said the plunder of Africa's resources culminated in unfair trade practices that were currently dogging the continent. Mr Seaton said in Zimbabwe, Britons cheated

King Lobengula into signing the Rudd Concession in 1888, which resulted in white settler farmers occupying vast tracts of land at the expense of the black majority.

Mr. Seaton's apology included these words: "We repent for taking rather than giving. Taking the riches and the lands of Africa. We repent for dehumanizing Africans, treating them as goods, calling them black ivory. We repent for robbing Africans of their history and identity. Today we ask for forgiveness in Jesus' name before you and God."

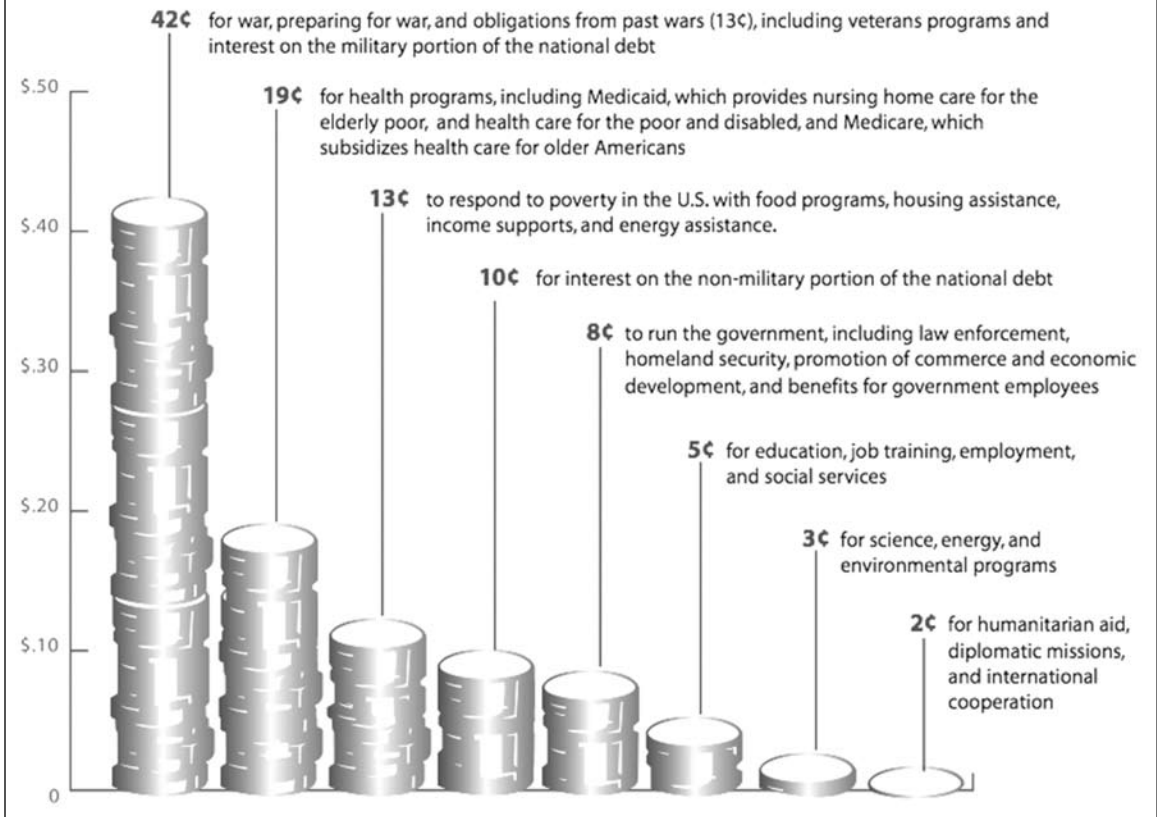
In response, Mr. Chissano said he was humbled by the gesture demonstrated by the Christian leaders. Chissano replied (amidst applause from the participants): "I wish I had the mandate to ask for forgiveness as well because most of the sins committed by Europeans were not committed by them alone....It is symbolic that this year's event is taking place in Zimbabwe, a country that is suffering the effects of unjust international relations, in which the mighty impose their will at will, a vivid reminder of colonialism."

The former Mozambican leader said he hoped the reconciliation process would encourage Zimbabweans to come together as a united nation to overcome the challenges facing the country. It was a pity, Mr. Chissano said, that most Europeans were defensive when confronted with the consequences of colonialism, saying that colonialism had gone and the reasons for African backwardness should be found only in bad governance and corruption.

for the million and-a-half Iraqi people,
mostly children, who have died of
malnourishment or starvation
as a result of an 11-year U.S. embargo
against the country.

Before I begin this poem:
two months of silence
for the Blacks under Apartheid
in South Africa,
where homeland security
made them aliens
in their own country. Nine months of silence

for the dead in Hiroshima
and Nagasaki, where death rained
down and peeled back

On Monday afternoon of this week, Slick Rich Daley pulled a fast one by announcing that he would veto the big-box ordinance which was passed in July of this year. The mayor and money from Wal-Mart were able to convince a few aldermen to switch their vote from advocates of the ordinance to opponents of the ordinance. For those who have been sleeping under a rock for the past few months, the big-box ordinance was to guarantee a livable wage and affordable health care for all of those working in big-box stores across the city.

Slick Daley on Monday vetoed this ordinance. I call him slick because he waited until after Sunday to announce that he would do it. Sunday would have given churches across the city the opportunity to get the word out and organize against this travesty. So he waited. Secondly, when the ordinance was initially passed, the ordinance was veto-proof. Daley was also able to get three people to change their votes, Alderman Shirley Coleman (16th ward), Alderman Daniel Solis (25th ward), and Alderman George Cardenas (12th ward).

For those who see this as a defeat, a second look may show this as an opportunity in at least three ways. The veto of this ordinance offers an opportunity to do a few things:

1. Question Representation. A citywide poll taken after the big-box ordinance passed in July showed that over 72% of the people of the city were in favor of the big box ordinance. With the turning of a few aldermen's votes, it is clear that neither the city council nor the Mayor represent the will of the people of the city of Chicago. We will have the opportunity to call them into question, especially with the aldermanic and mayoral races nearing.

TO DO JUSTICE

2. New Legislation. One of the arguments of the opponents of the big-box ordinance was that it unfairly targeted one group (Big Boxes). As a result, their claim was that this ordinance was unconstitutional, in violation of the Equal Protection Clause of the Constitution. The veto of this ordinance now gives us the opportunity to call for and create a new ordinance which calls for a livable wage for all businesses across the city of Chicago, inclusive of big boxes and little boxes.

3. Fair Compensation. Another of the arguments of the opponents of the big box ordinance was that the approval of the ordinance would deny tax revenues to the city of Chicago, because residents of the city would cross city lines to shop at Wal-Mart in the suburbs. Should the new legislation be written, and include all boxes, not just big boxes, fair compensation could be granted to workers with the tax revenue gained (according to proponents of Wal-Mart), and we could increase the minimum wage all over the city of Chicago. In other words, use the funds gained from tax revenue to reward the people who pay taxes and work in the city of Chicago. Don't use the funds gained to build another skyscraper while some people are living in poverty. Don't use those funds to bolster someone else's bottom line, while not distributing those funds to the people who need it. Fair Compensation!

The purpose of this column, today, is to let you know that this is not a defeat, but only the end of one round of this fight. We are on to the next round and will continue to fight "until justice rolls down like water, and righteousness as an ever-flowing stream," or "the race is not given to the swift or strong, but to the one who endures to the end." Let's answer the bell for the next round.

TO DO JUSTICE PART II

The health disparities across the globe are frightening. As it stands, health care is reserved for those with the money to pay rather than all those in need. Today, we participate with congregations across the state in Health Care Justice Sabbath. Today, we participate with congregations across the state in calling for justice in health care. Health care justice is a civil rights issue about which we must be concerned. We must take action to ensure that poverty does not prevent someone or some family from getting the care they need. Action must be preceded by education, however. When you know better you can do better. Please come to the chapel at 2:30 p.m., and hear medical doctors inform us as to what we can do to seek justice in health care.

Christian stewardship is the means by which we make the church and the kingdom a joy rather than a burden. Giving that hurts is poor giving, though it may be better than none. The real tragedy in the life of many a church member is not that he fails to give at least something, but that he misses all the joy of giving. When a person gives only his money, he is not a partner with God.

The church has just as great an obligation to teach people to be Christian in the use of their money as it has to teach people to be moral in their living. Giving that is little, grudging and reluctant is not likely to produce Christian joy. Some of us give only when we are prodded often enough and hard enough. Some of us give out of a sense of pride because of what might be said if we didn't. Though we are careful not to price our pride too high, some of us give out of a sense of need, quickened usually by an earnest appeal at a time when our defenses are weak. Very few of us give out of the only real source of Christian joy — out of the fullness of our love for Christ and our devotion to Him and to the cause to which we have committed our lives. That takes us a full step beyond the ordinary in our giving, for it makes it not merely a matter of our money, but of our hearts — of our best selves.

We ought to teach tithing not to get the tithe, but to get the tither — not to get his money, but to get him. When a person gives only his money, he is not a partner with God, he is only a patron of God and, between the two, lies all the difference in the world.

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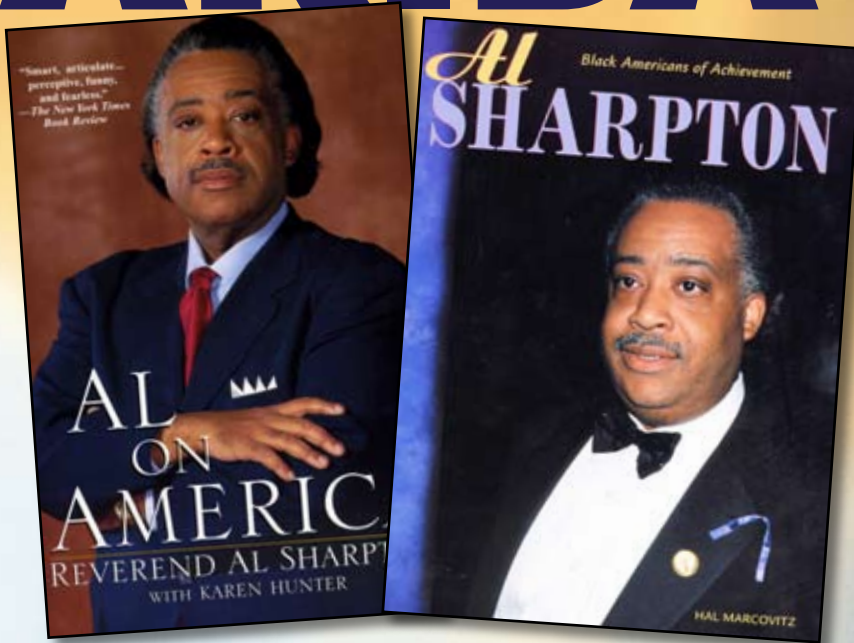
